Family Promise

An outreach opportunity for those interested:

St. Christopher's has elected to rotate with other area churches and organizations to take on rotating weeks throughout the year where we help families with children who need a safe place to stay on nights and weekends with meals.

On the weeks we are scheduled, our volunteers from St. Christopher's prepare and serve two to three evening meals to families without homes who are staying at the Holly Calvary United Methodist Church at 15010 N. Holly Road in Holly.

We are sometimes called upon to be evening hosts to the families, which means one or two of us will stay after dinner until 8:30 PM when the overnights hosts arrive.

Two or three of us from St. Christopher's work together to plan and serve the meals on the dates we have agreed to serve. This year, we served at Holly Calvary the week of January 28, and the week of April 29. **Our next scheduled service weeks are the week of July 29 and the week of October 21.**

Dinner is scheduled to begin at 6:00 pm each evening. We plan the menu in conjunction with the volunteer coordinators at Holly Calvary, and we each prepare and bring our dish or dishes to Holly Calvary in time to get the dining room set up with dishes and silverware from the Holly Calvary kitchen. We complete any food preparation and get it ready for serving by arriving between 5 and 5:15 PM. We appoint someone to lead a prayer before beginning eating the meal. We sit at tables with the families and visit while we eat. We have worked a couple of Saturday lunches, but that is not typical.

Occasionally, we make contributions of food items from members of St. Christopher's that are put in the food resources available at the Holly church or the Family Promise headquarters.



FR. DON'S DOODLES...

QUESTION POSED

The Vestry will receive a question from me on the 29th at our monthly meeting. By reading this column, you will receive the same question a few days earlier.

Although surely not alone, the St. Christopher's structure of Committees and Teams is not working well. Over the last three years I have tried just about everything I know to entice, lobby, coerce, request and maybe, although not intentionally, guilt folks into taking lay leader-

ship positions. I admit, my well is dry. I am coming-up empty handed. So, maybe it is the structure itself?

I should pause here with a Captain Obvious statement: attendance at church is important. To know what your church is doing and what is needed, one must attend if not every Sunday, close to it.

Here is my question: Do we need to overhaul our structure to find people interested in carrying out their baptismal ministry? With our current structure of Committees and Teams not working, should we consider something different and if so what is that?

Background: the Vestry Committees of Stewardship, Building and Grounds and Finance all need assistance. Only four Teams are functioning at all: Worship, Inreach, the new Prayer team, and the newly restarted Outreach Team which needs a chairperson. Committees are appointed by the priest and function under the Vestry. Teams are appointed by the priest and function with the priest in program areas. We need teams in areas such as Youth and Adult Formation, Welcoming, Beautification, Strategic Planning and almost anything. Vestry members are assigned as representatives to each active team.

All the above sounds good, but frankly it is not working. Lay-leadership and lay-involvement are absolutely necessary for a growing and vital parish. New folks visiting are less likely to return when they are not greeted and then contacted by welcoming and later asked if they would like to participate in a area of need in the parish. We are doing outreach, but we are in need of coordination. The days of "Rector does all" or "Father knows best" are gone. In almost every area, it is (and frankly always has been) the laity which provide the leadership. Now-a-days most parochial priests are not employed full-time. The ministry of outreach, caring and praying and welcoming and educating are baptismal ministry.

Back to my question to the Vestry and to you: if our current system is broken, should we try to fix it and what can we try or try again? Or, should we come up with something new and different? There may well be a bunch of reasons and or excuses of "why" people do not express their love of Christ in serving, but generally we cannot do much if anything about what has happened. My question is "what" can we do, and "what" should we do?


My request is that you pray first and then let me know "what." Thank you!

I know that many of our church are encouraged by the beautiful playing we have been hearing from our Keates and Geissor pipe organ. When our organ project began, there was MUCH to do! Fowler Organ completely rebuilt the wind system and console, installed several new windchests, and refurbished & revoiced a significant number of ranks of pipes - this was a mammoth undertaking.

Then, however, Brian was faced with a much greater challenge than any organ could present--- he learned that he had a serious health problem and was going to be in for a tough battle; Brian fought his cancer valiantly for over a year and a half, but sadly, succumbed on April 19th, 2018. Service was held at St. Mary's Cathedral in Lansing. He made it to 70 years of age. Brian began Fowler - Hebert Organ Company in 1978 (in July 2017, he bought out Hebert Organ Company in Detroit when the owner retired). During Brian's illness, Jeff Walker has been helping to keep things on track with our instrument; he has contacted Brian's very capable successors and has been assured that St. Christopher's is high on the list of projects to complete in the near future.



We are very close to completion of this project. There are a few mechanical issues; some final programming issues for console control; and the voicing of the pedal posaune (trombone); after samples have been set at the church, those pipes will be sent out to a reed specialist. Once returned they will be placed in the chamber and receive final regulation and tuning. Thank you, Mr. Walker for all of your help.

NancyLee Fawcett has been hard at work, too, making certain that the Flint Master Singers will be here to participate in a service over the coming summer. On July 22, we will have the beautiful sound of this vocal ensemble at St. Christopher, under the direction of Tom Fortier. Thank you, NancyLee!

As always, if you might have a little free-time in your schedule, our own St. Christopher Adult Choir meets Wednesday evenings, following soup supper. We rehearse from 7-8. If you are able and have time to sing, please come join our choir! We love offering our talents in this way for the Lord. Choir will begin our summer hiatus after June 3rd. This means that if you play an instrument, or sing, we would love to schedule your talent for a Sunday morning service during June, July or August. Please let me know if you might be available!

What would happen if our mortgage was paid off? When we look at where St. Chris is right now, when we look at where we want to be, and when we look at why we aren't there, one of the first reasons that we are all quick to say is, "well we have a 1.8 million dollar mortgage, how can we afford to do..... (fill in that blank)" and this is a valid statement. But have you ever wondered just what would happen if that financial burden was lifted? I haven't. Let's explore this together.

A paid mortgage won't make people walk through our doors. It won't bring us the newcomers we hope for, it won't bring us the plethora of spirited children and families that I know we all long for.

A paid mortgage will not fill our pews.

A paid mortgage will not bring us lay leadership. It will not bring us more lay participation. It will not lessen the burden on our small core of worker bees.

A paid mortgage would not have solved the problem that 9 days before we were set to have the diocesan confirmation here at STC we only had a crucifer and a book bearer, and we still needed 2 torches and streamers. A paid mortgage will not bring us more acolytes, and lessen the heavy load on the small, dedicated group we have.

A paid mortgage will not make us a fruitful congregation that practices radical hospitality, passionate worship, intentional faith development, and risk-taking mission and service.

A paid mortgage will not change our thought of new comers who walk through the door from visitors who drop by unexpectedly to guests in God's house; guests who we should expect and make special preparations for.

A paid mortgage will not make us do welcoming well.
A paid mortgage will not grow our children's ministries.

A paid mortgage will not suddenly bring us the properly trained volunteers we need to open our nursery to families.

A paid mortgage will not give us the lay volunteers needed to really, truly do the outreach mission work that God calls us to do.

Now, a paid mortgage of over \$1.8 million dollars does have some large financial benefits. A paid mortgage would definitely make our bottom line balance! It will keep our doors open. A paid mortgage would ensure our savings stays intact and can grow. It would secure our financial future.

The General Convention is the decision making body of The Episcopal Church. Made up of the House of Deputies and the House of Bishops, it gathers every three years to take up the business of the church - voting on resolutions, worshipping together, and having conversations about what it means to be an ancient community of faith in a modern age. The 79th General Convention of the Episcopal Church will take place this July in Austin, Texas.

Our deputation has planned two sets of gatherings for our diocese - Pre-General Convention Meetings and Post-General Convention Meetings.

At the Pre-General Convention Meetings, we'll hear from our deputies and bishop on what we expect to come up at the church-wide level. We'll also learn how to stay connected with the deputation while they're in Austin.

At the Post-General Convention Meetings, we'll hear again from our deputies and bishop on what happened in Austin - what resolutions were passed, how will they affect our diocese and our individual congregations?



SCRIP

The gift card Scrip program is still going. There is a special side of the kiosk with order forms and envelopes. Simply fill out your order form and put in an envelope with cash or check and put in the offering plate on Sunday.

Not sure how Scrip works? It's easy! You buy gift cards for everything from gifts to groceries and we deliver the physical gift cards (just like you get in stores) to you the following Sunday. You pay the face value of the card and St. Christopher's gets a special rebate (usually 4 - 15% of the face value of the card) from the Shop with Scrip company. You buy gift cards you would be getting already through our program and St. Christopher's gets money! It's that easy!

We need someone from 8 am and 10:15 am services to help with our Scrip program. You would just help take orders and give people their cards on Sunday mornings. Very easy! See Angela Campbell if you would be interested in helping with this great fundraising program for St. Christopher's.

CONSIDERING OUR GIVING CHURCH..

Many behind the scenes St. Christopher's parishioners actively work as God's hands, feet and eyes in the mission of helping others who need a boost, a prayer, or material goods to make life easier. These activities fall under the label of OUTREACH.

Supplying food to the needy is ongoing; other activities emerge periodically during the church year to fill specific needs.

A **prayer ministry** is now established, and corporate intercession occurs weekly on Mondays at 2 p.m., wherever the prayer warriors happen to be. Prayer needs are collected each Sunday. Anyone is welcome to request prayer and to be a member of this team.


We just finished up a week at the beginning of May volunteering to serve meals to families through **Family Promise** (see Bobbie Walton's article on page 4).
