# MAINTAINING A PEACEFUL SPIRIT DURING TIMES OF TRANSITION

I'm wearing my Canon to the Ordinary hat right now. In my work with congregations going through the phases of a clergy transition, I find that the point we're at right now often feels like the most anxious period in the entire experience. The former priest has just moved on and the new priest is not yet here; what is going on and who is taking care of things? It's normal to feel more unsettled than usual; the stability that our church community offers is an important part of our sense of well-being. And it's normal to be impatient with the process and to feel like things are taking too long. Here are some thoughts on those.

First, the stability that our church community offers is no small thing. Even when our attention on a regular day has no connection to church, when our thoughts are trained on work or family or other matters, the sense that our church is with us and supports us remains in the backdrop of our reality. We know that we can depend on it for some segment of our needs, and the priest is a crucial piece of that structure. I say crucial, yes, but it's good to be reminded that the priest is far from the only thing that makes our community strong and secure. We have so many others who make this place the special community that it is, and, like you, they want good things for all of us as well. In times of clergy transition we have the opportunity to learn just how much our church benefits from the gifts that all of us offer to the community, and we can celebrate and take heart in that knowledge. While things may be a little different in this interval of time, they can be just as important and spiritually satisfying if we put faith in the truth that God is present to us in all circumstances.

Second, this process does take a long time. There are layers and layers of processes. It should be simpler and quicker, shouldn't it? I am intimately familiar with all of the things that make up a search process, and while we can tinker with how we do them, they are really an intricate system of dependencies all balanced on the backs of busy human beings who have complicated lives. We can perhaps do the parts that we are assigned as quickly and efficiently as we can, but we can't assume that all the other parts can do that all the time. Things happen. The bishop has to be the bishop for all 44 congregations of the diocese, and so might not be able to do one of his parts as quickly as we might want. (It's easy to pick on the bishop, so he won't mind if I use him as an example!) And I am also convinced that all the parts matter; this is not the same thing as a standard hiring situation in the world of business or education or other disciplines. Your relationship with your priest is not like other relationships, so it follows that the discernment process will be different as well. The church does do some things right, and making sure we do this process right will reap so many benefits in the future; it's worth it to take the time it takes.

Even with those explanations, which might be helpful, it may still feel frustrating to sit on the sidelines wondering about the future. I know of at least two things you can do that might help you maintain a sense of peace. First, if you want to know something, ask. Ask the vestry, ask the search committee, and if they aren't available, ask me. We don't always know what you want to know and when, so ask your questions. If you thrive by being in command of knowledge, ask us what you need to know and hopefully the answers will help settle your concern. Second, pray. Pray that God will lead the search committee, the bishop, and the next priest to a common recognition of the potential for satisfactory and enriching ministry and mission that can be realized here at St. Christopher's when a good and loving priest is working alongside the rest of us for the building of God's kingdom.

You are ever in my prayers; please pray for me.

# GOING DEEPER WITH PRAYER DURING LENT

Our Ash Wednesday service includes an exhortation to observe a holy Lent and suggests several ways in which we might engage in deeper communion with God during the season. In addition to fasting and engagement with God's Word, we are exhorted to pray. Imagine that! The Prayer Team is going to offer two new opportunities for prayer during Lent and hopes that you might try one or both of them out – try them on for size, if you will – and see if you feel like your prayer life is enriched by them.

The first is a series of prayer stations that will be installed around the church. These prayer stations will each offer a different activity or prayer prompt to help you pray using tools, senses, or perhaps even ideas that you might not be used to. There will be two stations in the parish hall, three in the narthex, and one each in the library and columbarium chapel, for a total of seven. At each station you'll find some instructions and the tools you might need to engage the prayer station. These stations will be installed throughout Lent and Holy Week. Any time you are in the church building and have a few minutes you are invited to check out the prayer stations and explore a different way to pray.

The second is an opportunity for healing prayer and anointing that will be available during worship at the 10:15 service on Sundays in Lent. During the administration of communion, there will be two stations at the back of the church where a trained member of the prayer team will be available to pray with and anoint you for healing of mind, body, or spirit. You're welcome to request healing prayer for another person as well. If you'd like to give this kind of prayer a try, simply go to the altar and receive communion as you usually would, and then go to one of the prayer stations in the back of the church. The prayer team member will ask for what or whom you'd like to pray, and if the prayer is for yourself, will offer anointing with holy oil. If you've never experienced this kind of prayer or have not been anointed, you may find this kind of prayer and the tactile sensation of the oil to be a deeply satisfying manifestation of God's presence.

I hope you'll give one or both of these prayer opportunities a try, and let the prayer team know what the experience was like for you. It is our hope that your journey through Lent this year enriches your relationship with God and that your prayer life offers sustenance for your soul.





We ask your direction and guidance for all those who choose our new spiritual leader that we may receive a faithful pastor who will care for your people and equip us for our ministries.


Grant us perception, faithfulness, and joy, so that we may hear your voice in all our deliberations.


Grant us also the desire and the ability to truly hear each other
