



A NOTE FROM THE "CURATE"

I have some news to share with you. You may recall that I have been serving a "curacy" at St. Christopher's. The term is used to mean a ministry assignment one receives shortly after being ordained. As a newly minted priest, one must "cure," gain experience, before being turned loose into the wider church. Think of it as a sort of apprenticeship that young priests serve under the tutelage of an experienced rector. I was blessed to serve my curacy with Fr. Don and Rev. Ann, two very gifted priests, in very different circumstances.

At the beginning of this journey together, the vestry and the diocese agreed to a sharing arrangement with regard to my time. I was to be 67% diocesan staff and 33% St. Christopher's curate, and a letter of agreement along with financial arrangements were made. I was to remain on diocesan staff in a primary role, and serve St. Christopher's as a part-time curate.

We made an agreement that my curacy would end at the time of the new rector's call. This has turned out to be a wise choice, financially and realistically. A member of the diocesan staff retired late last year, and a decision was made not to replace her. As a consequence, I have more to do now than I used to, and the time has come for me to return to full-time status with the diocese. As of January 1, I am 100% on diocesan payroll, and the funds previously used by St. Christopher's to support my position are back in its own coffers for use in other ways.

And, of even more significance, Fr. Jerry is present among us and beginning a new ministry. It is a good time for my ministry to decrease so that his can increase. Your new rector will serve the congregation well, of that I have no doubt, and I encourage you to take every effort to get to know him and to help him as he transitions into life among us.

However, I will not be completely disappearing. I have been blessed to be asked by Fr. Jerry to stay on in an honorary capacity. It is common in some dioceses for clergy on diocesan staff to have a 'home congregation' where they assist when their diocesan duties don't require them to be elsewhere. Fr. Jerry recognized that I needed to be able to focus on my diocesan role, but he very kindly offered to let me stay here and hang up my stoles next to his. I was so grateful for his offer, and I gladly accepted.

So, expect to continue to see my face, albeit with less frequency than in the past. As life in the diocese moves through cycles of busy and slow times, I will be able to be with you when it's slower, and not as much when it is not. We are not likely to find a regular or dependable pattern, at least for a while, as so much continues to be in flux. As I am a priest in a diocese with a clergy shortage, I expect to be called to all corners when in-person worship resumes, but I will be here as often as I can. I am humbled by the faith you have put in me, and I look forward to continuing to serve our God alongside you.

Greetings My Sisters and Brothers,

It is difficult to believe that as I write this, I have been here a month already! It is impossible for me to convey just how deeply grateful I am for all of you. Beginning with food dropped off at the hotel, many phone calls with you, meeting a few of you in person and just the overall warmth and friendliness of everyone, I feel truly blessed to be here.

I can't begin to thank Elizabeth, Canon Michael, and Jane enough! You have all been extremely helpful in this transition period. Moving to a new parish and a new state brings a lot of excitement. Arriving during a pandemic is definitely quite different. Like you, I long for the day when we are able to gather together in our beautiful worship space. However, until things seem to calm down, worship online will need to continue. The Standing Committees of Eastern and Western Michigan have a difficult job and I don't envy them. They feel that safety must come first and I fully agree. I would much rather hold off for a while than become a news flash on television for being a hotspot. We want to be known in our community, but definitely not because of the pandemic! Patience and strong faith will see us through.

In meeting with our Vestry, I have discussed the need for in-depth planning. It would be in our favor if we created a three, five and ten year plan. When we create it, it must have specific goals that are measurable and realistic. For example, we can't just say that we want to grow our membership by 20% each year. We have to have a map on exactly how we want to get there and ways to check our progress along the way. The Vestry has agreed to form a sub committee to begin the work on these plans. Please pray for our Vestry members as we have some hard work to do. I am certain that they are up to the challenge! Don't be surprised if you get some phone calls to ask for input. (You can always talk to me as well!)

Finances are always difficult to talk about. We must be realistic about our future. This year, we currently are operating at a deficit. If you are able, we need to make up around \$70,000. If you can pitch in a few extra dollars here and there, it would be greatly appreciated! Please understand that even though we are not meeting in person, the expenses of our parish continue. Salaries, insurance, utilities must all be paid. So, if you haven't pledged, please prayerfully consider doing so. Our pledge is a commitment to God, not to a rector, not to a building.

In the coming months and years, it is going to take us all, working together and opening our minds and hearts to new possibilities. St. Paul gives us the beautiful image of the Body of Christ, reminding us that we absolutely need one another. Now is the time for us to arise from our sleep, pick up our mat and walk. Walk together as we figure out who God is calling us to be.
