Construction began on this 20th-century gothic-style Cathedral in 1907, but it wasn't finished until 1990. It has been the site of presidential funerals, inaugural prayer services, and many historic moments, including the final Sunday sermon delivered by the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr."

Also, another place to observe and enjoy the fabulous musical traditions of **St. Bart's Church in NYC. Their website is: stbarts.org.**

"St. Bartholomew's Church has a long tradition of musical excellence and an uncommon influence on the musical life of America. Its history has included some of the most distinguished leaders in church music in the U.S. including Leopold Stokowski, David McK. Williams, Harold Friedell, Jack Ossewaarde, James Litton, and William K. Trafka."

And, perhaps, in our own backyard, **The Cathedral Church of St. Paul at detroitcathedral.org**, where, too, the music is glorious!

I would also like to mention that February 1st. begins our one month celebration of Black History. I do

try throughout our musical year, to support and program works of African-American composers - two names you may recognize are Moses Hogan and David Hurd. Throughout our church year, we sing arrangements of Mr. Hogan (an Oberlin Conservatory and that little music conservatory in NYC -Juilliard-grad), he arranged/compiled the Oxford Book of Spirituals. And, perhaps some of you may have noticed that we often chant musical gems of David Hurd (also a grad of Oberlin Conservatory and the Juilliard School). Both of these composers are esteemed and greatly respected musical giants.

A NOTE ON GOODBYES FROM THE REV. CANON MICHAEL SPENCER

Goodbyes are hard. Well, not all of them. I'm sure we are all looking forward to the day when we get to say goodbye to this pandemic. But when friends must take their leave, we often get a catch in the throat, as the emotion embodies in us and our feelings inform our physicality. Goodbyes take some doing. According to that expert of experts, the internet, there are at least nine stages of goodbye in the midwest:

- ı. "Welp"
- 2. Hugs
- 3. Walk to the door
- 4. Chat at the door

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- 5. "We really should be going"
- 6. More hugs
- 7. Hand on the doorknob
- 8. A bit more chat
- 9. Wave through the window

I would just add a toot of the car horn so that those inside the house know that they can turn off the porch light. The smile dancing around your face is a recognition of the fact that we ritualize even the small parts of our lives. Certainly as faithful Christians we know the power of ritual, and we use it extensively in our worship, hopefully to glorious effect. We can't help but ritualize moments in our lives that have some kind of significance to us, even if it's just a recognition that from time to time we must part ways, and that even though we do, our connection and our relationship endures. So we go through the steps of goodbye, to help us acknowledge and enact the change of status, and prepare ourselves for what comes next. We do this again and again as the various actors in the play that is our lives move on and off the stage.

This note to you is another step in the ritual goodbye underway between me and the St. Christopher's community. It is a chance for me to say thank you for sharing your selves with me in these four or so years together. I couldn't have imagined what lay before us, at the beginning. I knew that there would be lots of learning, lots of challenges, and that did come to pass. Certainly some of the lessons for me were not of the kind I would have expected! But that's probably true for everyone starting out at something new, and it might be true for you as well. In any case, I am grateful to God for the ministry we have shared, and I remember you in my prayers of gratitude every day.

It's also a good time to say this: for my failings, mistakes, and poorer choices, I am sorry. To anyone who felt uncared for, ignored, or forgotten, I am sorry. If grace is real, then it must be real when forgiveness is offered to parting friends, for though



Christ justly calls on us to pray for our enemies, the hurt that comes from a friend is even harder to bear. I know that I will continue to carry you in my heart, albeit in a new way, and I hope you find space for me in yours.

The tradition is that when clergy and congregation part, they keep their distance. I know this to be good practice. I have seen the ill effects when these important boundaries are ignored. But that distance doesn't mean that affection and care are diminished. It just means that in doing so we make room for the new people in our midst; you here in Grand Blanc, and me in Southern Ohio. Will we see each other again? I certainly hope so, but if we don't that doesn't mean our connection doesn't last; it simply takes on a new characteristic, one of blessed memory.

"Now unto him that is able to keep you from falling, and to present you faultless before the presence of his glory with exceeding joy; the only wise God our Savior, be glory and majesty, dominion and power, both now and ever. Amen."
