notes from the... Music Room

Hello! I wanted to use this space, well, for a number of wonderful things I was hoping to talk about, and first on this list is just a little bit about Lessons and Carols. I thought that perhaps there were a few of us at St. Christopher's who may not fully know the origin of this service. So, I have nabbed this bit of information from the official Espicopal News Page, and would like to share the following: "Lessons & Carols services in the Anglican tradition began in 1878 and was formalized as a Christmas service in 1880 by the Bishop of Truro, later Archbishop of Canterbury, Edward Benson. An Advent version of the service – normally carried out as a procession with lessons and carols – developed slightly later at King's College and is now celebrated around the world, normally as an evening service on the first or second Sunday in the season of Advent.

During the service, scriptural readings are interspersed with choral presentations and hymn, all of which recall mankind's longing for liberation from sin and death, and our hope and expectation for both the first and second coming of Christ the Lord".

Now, too, I think something that is of further interest is the origin of these lovely carols we all know and love--- (The First Nowell, O Little Town of Bethlehem, Hark! The Herald Angels Sing, O Come, O Come Emannuel"---carols. Carols were first sung in Europe thousands of years ago, but these were not specifically Christmas Carols. They were pre-Christian/pagan songs, sung during Winter Solstice events/celebrations which included dancing around stone circles--no 'Once in Royal David's City' for this crowd! The Winter Solstice is the shortest day of the year, usually happening around the 21st or 22nd of December. Now, too, did you know that the word 'carol' actually means dance (specifically a circle dance)? Over time now, It has come to mean a song of joy, a song of praise! Carols used to be written and sung during all four seasons, but only the tradition of singing them at Christmas has really survived. Is this not so very interesting?

As Christmastime (remembering the birth of Jesus) then started to be celebrated at the same time as the Solstice, so the early Christians started singing Christian songs instead of pagan/pre-Christian ones. In 129, a Roman Bishop said that a song called "Angel's Hymn" should be sung at a Christmas service in Rome. Truly, I wonder what we might have as a service today, had this Roman Bishop not thought to include an "Angel's Hymn"? Food for thought. Another famous early Christmas Hymn was written in 760, by Cosmas of Jerusalem, for the Greek Orthodox Church. You all remember Cosmas, don't you? He is known as Saint Cosmas, of the Holy City (Jerusalem); Cosmas, the Melodist, Cosmas the Poet (died 773 or 794); ---too, he was a bishop, and a hymnographer in the Eastern tradition. He is venerated as a saint in the Easter Orthodox and Catholic Churches. So, ultimately, not too long after this time period, many composers all over Europe started writing 'Christmas carols'.

However, (--sigh--) not many people liked them as they were all written and sung in Latin (a language that the common man did not generally understand). By the time of the Middle Ages (let's say around thei200s), most people had lost interest in celebrating Christmas altogether. Crisis in my book! Thankfully, this attitude was changed by St. Francis of Assisi (he is the man!) when, in 1223, he started his Nativity Performances which took place all over Italy. The people in these plays sang songs or 'canticles' which told the story of Christ's birth. Thus began the shift of singing choruses only in Latin; Now they were sung in a language the common man could understand and ultimately then participate! This version of the new carols spread throughout all of Europe, which brings us to today; here we are, at this moment in time, in little Grand Blanc, Michigan, celebrating this beautiful tradition of Lessons and Carols at St. Christopher's! I prattled on here a bit, and will therefore share other 'wonderful things' which have been happening for us musically at St. Christopher in our next Trumpeter issue.

Please do try to come to our Lessons and Carols service, December 11th, at 9:00 a.m.

In just a few weeks, we will gather around a manger. And as we gather, may we be reminded of the humble birth of Jesus, Emanuel, God with us. Today and always. May God bring you hope, love, joy and peace in this season and always! I thank God each day for all of you! You are such a blessing to me and to one another. We are a wonderful community of believers!


